Ted's Retirement Story

My dog, Ted, has retired from his visiting days. When he became lame last year and no longer able to jump into and out of my car, Pete made a ramp for him. This worked well and was quite a feature for his friends, at the two 'Aspire' Residential Care Homes. The residents could see that he also had physical difficulties, some of them know how it feels. I made the sad but obvious decision to retire Ted and did this before Christmas. With the heat of Summer coming the time was right. Over the years I have never visited with my dogs during the heat in consideration of their comfort.

For the 'Aspire 'staff and residents, plenty of extra 'happenings 'at this happy, busy time of the year would fill their days well and they would not miss our visits so much.....these thoughts filled my head.

Taya, who supervised my visits with 'Aspire 'was so generous in her understanding and very kindly made it easier for us all with both 'Good-bye 'visits on the same day. She was with me and Ted, as we said our farewells. Plenty of hugs and kisses were given as well as a bright posy for me and some lovely hand-crafted cards and delicious doggy-treats for Ted. The lump in my throat was there all the time, as I held it together, knowing I would miss these times so much. Ted, unaware gave his best, standing lamely for photos but enjoying all the extra affection.

As this little story is typed for our magazine, I am thinking back to this time 3 years ago. We were missing Rosie our previous C.F.P.T. dog and much loved pet. Rosie died peacefully but suddenly on 31st December 2015. Our family had not yet met Ted. He was in the dog-pound at Waitomo, having been 'picked-up wandering in cattle country by the dog ranger '......as we were told when a volunteer kindly bought him to us on February 22nd 2016.

Missing a dog by my side, I had been looking on-line and had seen Ted's smiley face and read his story on 'Pets on the Net' and phoned to make further enquiries. The rest is history. Ted is to this day a lovely pet for us and once approved by C.F.P.T proved to be very good with his visiting. He was a little anxious at first and as with his lameness later, residents identified with it and loved him all the more. One lady said 'I know how it feels to be anxious Ted'.

Recently Ted's vet recommended X-rays under sedation. These show Lumbosacral Degenerative Stenosis.... A 'spur 'on his lower spine. He was given a steroid epidural while still sedated. His hips are perfect but arthritis is present in other joints. These conditions are very typical for an older working dog of Ted's type, German Shepherd X Huntaway. He has pain-relief (Nupentin) so his days are less sore. Ted enjoys a ride in the car every day, a long sleep in our air-conditioned home in the after-noon and a wander in the garden at dusk. He is still keen to be active and the 'smile 'never leaves his lovely face. 'Good boy Ted '.

Committee Snippets

The Canine Friends Pet Therapy Group will hold its Annual General Meeting In May, 2019 in Wellington. The Secretary will send all the appropriate information to you prior to that date.

Canine Therapy - It Works Both Ways!

I have been doing canine pet therapy with my dog, Nina, a 3-year Black Russian Terrier, for over a year now at the Hutt Hospital and this has - and continues to be - a very rewarding and humbling experience for me.

Nina is a beautiful, big, calm and very impressive dog who has become very well-known and is a huge hit with the staff, the visitors and the patients and I do not think a week goes by when someone does not say to me – "Thank you, you have made my day". However, during the year, the experience was very rewarding in a different way for me.

I was getting ready to take Nina to the hospital when I got a sudden pain in the middle of my back, which I dismissed as muscular strain and took a couple of Panadol and thought no more of it. However, as I was going around the hospital the pain returned and I started to get some pain/sensation down my left arm and into my left jaw, which was not that uncomfortable but made me think I needed to get it checked out as, being a former nurse, I knew this type of symptom was significant but still did not think the matter was urgent as I felt fine.

I was on my way to the Coronary Care Unit and thought I would just see who was there that I could have a chat with — having got to know a lot of the staff over the year but also thinking perhaps I would go home and make an appointment with my doctor to get this checked out.

I only got to the Hutt CCU reception area when the staff who know and love her came out to pat and greet Nina and make a fuss over her – as is usual - when Debbie, one of the reception staff turned to me and said "and how are you today". I replied (semi-joking) 'Well, actually, I wonder if I am having a coronary. I only have a bit of pain in my back and I am sure it is only muscular but I also have this pain down my left arm and jaw".

The people around me and Nina became quite concerned and told me to go to A&E to which I replied that I had Nina and perhaps I could just go home and then ring my doctor (still thinking that it really was not serious) when one of the people said "I am a cardiologist and you need to go to A&E now". I didn't really have anyone I thought I could call at a moment's notice to come and get Nina, so Debbie, kindly offered to look after her and I took myself down to A&E thinking I would only be a short time down there.

Well – 40 minutes later, after receiving a very swift and professional diagnosis, I was in the Catheter Lab in Wellington Hospital having an angiogram and two blockages in my coronary arteries stented and by about 2pm was in the CCU at Wellington Hospital, all fixed. My two daughters, Jane and Kate and Paddy, a good friend, were there waiting for me – looking very concerned – and I was sitting up feeling marvellous. Kate had already been out to get Nina and had passed the speeding flashing ambulance on the way and got very worried— when I was sitting in the ambulance thinking it was all quite exciting being transported in a red-light ambulance! 3 days later I was home, feeling very well and thankful.

I had been having an acute coronary but did not have the usual classic symptoms of chest pain or breathless, feeling unwell, etc and if it had not been for the pain/sensation in my left arm and jaw, would not have thought anything at all about the symptoms that day and would have ignored the pain in my back for as long I could. Also, as I live alone, and if

I had been doing my usual activities (had actually planned to move some furniture that afternoon!) the result could have been a lot different. Because I was treated so quickly and efficiently, I have only mild damage around the blockages which is great.

I thank my beautiful Nina and Canine Friends Pet Therapy for possibly saving my life or at least reducing some of the damage that could have ensued had I not been in the hospital that day and treated so promptly. Someone was sure looking out for me that day!

I am also very thankful and grateful for the superb and professional treatment I received from all of the marvellous medical and hospital staff and to be living in a time and a country where this is readily available to us and I count my blessings.

Cody



After I've said my hellos Mum and I take to the floor and I perform an array of tricks from roll over to walking on my Mum's feet, jumping over obstacles, finding a hidden ball, identifying my Mum's scent from an assortment of cloths...we do all manner of things and I really enjoy being centre stage even though there are no treats available for this work. If at any time during this performance my Mum gets side tracked and starts talking to the residents I quietly sit myself next to her and sit up and beg. This is a really good way to win back your audience and even more important when in this position I pull my tummy right in so I look really thin and in desperate need of food. During this performance a staff member slowly goes around the room with a trolley and what's on this trolley is very important so listen up! Mostly there are cups of liquid and a treat called "cake" you can tell if it's cake as the humans make a soft "mmmmmm" noise, like humming.

Once everyone is making this "mmmmm" noise and the room is quiet you must bring attention back to your very thin self, to do this you offer a cute behaviour like sit up and beg or sometimes I lie down and put my front paws over my eyes as if I can't bare to watch. So, you do your cute behaviour and just wait, trust me it won't take long until someone notices you and abracadabra you are offered some cake too, cake is really special and yummy, I don't think Mum likes me eating it but she lets me have a small piece. The other delicious thing that occasionally comes on the trolley is not in cups but this time in glasses and it's bubbling, the humans make a different noise for this, it's more of an "oooooooo" this comes with "chips" you can tell it's not cake as this arrives in small dishes and each person gets their own little bowl. For the best result, you must wait patiently until everyone has been served, then start with the person with the kindest eyes and just sit next to them, look cute, and once they look at you, give them a big wide eyed look, hold in your tummy and gently offer a paw - I guarantee you will be given a chip. Chips are totally different from any other treat as they make a loud crunching noise in your mouth and they almost dissolve on your tongue leaving a slightly salty taste, they are absolutely delicious. Now, you need to be quite quick at this stage and as soon as you've eaten your chip move on to the next person and apply the same process.

So, to make the most of your Canine Friends Pet Therapy visit you just need to stick to a few simple rules

- 1. Act quietly at all times.
- 2. Make eye contact with all humans.
- 3. Remain attentive to your owner, maintain the bright eyes, waggy tail look
- 4. Learn as many cute tricks as you can and should attention move away from you, put on your best show. Stick to the above and you will return home with a full tummy, content in the knowledge your visit was a success.
