## **Introducing MacDuff**

MacDuff (pictured above) is a five-year-old Beardie/Huntaway cross male. Liz Scott tells us his story:

We adopted him from the SPCA when he was about five months old. He had been seized by them as he was a very sick puppy and his owner couldn't afford vet treatment. He was put into isolation for several weeks, with what was originally suspected as parvovirus - but it was obviously not, as he survived!

I was volunteering at the kennels when he came out of isolation and it was 'love at first sight' on both sides. However... I had to convince my husband that we needed a third dog and I was so desperate that I offered to give up smoking in order to adopt him. This worked a treat and am proud to say I'm still a non-smoker.

MacDuff is a laidback, gentle giant and extremely intelligent show him what you want once and he knows what to do. He loves to swim and has to be persuaded to get out of the lake/river so we can complete our walk. He loves barking and to have his tummy tickled — he rolls over onto his back without any bidding.

There is very little he dislikes, but handling of his front feet is borne very stoically, with little tugs to ask for his foot back.

There is something about him that draws in total strangers wanting to meet him and it's often been commented that he looks like 'Hairy McLairy'. I add that he must have been crossed with Hercules Morse because he's as big as a horse!

MacDuff is a one-in-a-million dog and we have a very close bond which doesn't happen with every dog. He is a Canine Friend Pet Therapy dog and visits Awatere Rest Home and Village (formerly Trevellyn) every week. He brings smiles and laughter to the residents.

He has also recently become a 'Reading Buddy' with the Hamilton City Library programme. He has gained his Canine Good Citizen Gold certification and, when he was younger, competed in Dog Agility and Flygility. He loved these sports but, because of his poor start in life, his immune system had been compromised and this has resulted in the early onset of osteoarthritis in most of his joints, so had to be retired from strenuous exercise.

He also suffers from a very sensitive tummy and is kept on a chicken-based diet.

He will also bear a scar around his neck for the rest of his life from a tight cord/wire cutting into his skin when a puppy.

Despite MacDuff's poor start he bears no grudge or malice and gives 100 percent to enjoying life. 42
