## Around the regions — Auckland

I am the Liaison Officer and Assessor for the Auckland region and I have been a member since 2011. I am assisted by Julie Warder (Group Events Organiser) and Kim Greubner (Placements Officer) without whose help I could not do what I am doing. We are also lucky to have Carol Drew in Auckland, our nationwide Volunteer Mentor.

The Auckland Region of Canine Friends Pet Therapy is rather large, from Pukekohe in the South to Wellsford up North. With such a huge area, we also have a massive regional membership. As at 11 May 2021, I am looking after 129 active members which is growing every month.

We have all breeds of dogs, from little Griffons to Newfoundlands and every mix and size in between but they all have one thing in common: they have the happy and gentle temperament to seek and accept loves and cuddles from people they have never met.

We are able to place our volunteer members and their awesome dogs at rest homes, hospices and general hospitals, usually near where they live. In fact, we are constantly getting requests from these organisations for one of our volunteer/dog duos to come and visit their residents or patients on a regular basis. Demand often exceeds supply!

Sometimes we get special requests from a health professional to visit an individual who lives in their own home and may have physical or mental health disability. These are organised on a caseby-case basis and the volunteers who put their hands up for these special assignments are often going over and above what they do already for Canine Friends.

The last three years have seen our volunteers and their dogs placed at North Shore, Auckland and Middlemore General Hospitals with more requests coming in from other wards as the word gets around. These placements have a lot of hoops to jump through but once put in place, are hugely rewarding for everyone involved, whether staff, patients or volunteers).


